MESSAGE FROM DR. JIMMEKA ANDERSON, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



It is hard to believe that we are entering year four with the Black Girls Film Camp and have built a national community with nearly 200 girls and women. None of this would be possible without our amazing leadership team, phenomenal board of directors, publicist, and volunteers who dedicate their time, creativity, and resources to the organization. This year I have had the honor of meeting with several foundation leaders who have believed in the mission of this work and became funding partners, contributing money and in-kind products to support programming for the 2023 camp year. Their investment helped to support Black Girls Film Camp in bringing in nearly \$400,000 this year alone and further exceeding our \$300,000 goal for fundraising. I am forever grateful for each and every individual who has sat down to meet with me about the vision of this work and decided it was worth investing and advocating for a liberated space for Black girls to create and share their stories through film.

This year was mind blowing not only financially, but also through the programmatic experiences and partnerships that were made. Thank you to Alison Trope at USC Annenberg for continuing to serve as a premiere partner with Black Girls Film Camp to host our annual LA Retreat. Our second-year retreat at USC in LA was beyond EPIC!

I would like to send a warm thank you to Kristi Shuton and Lezlee Williams at Disney Studios for coordinating an unforgettable customized experience for our girls to visit Disney Studios at Burbank, learn about careers in Post-Production, and have lunch with Disney Executives. I also want to give a huge shout out to Mercedes Cooper, Tammy Garnes, and Jerrell Curry at ARRAY for creating an extremely memorable experience for our 2023 cohort at the ARRAY Creative Campus. The 2023 teen directors got to try Ava's new ice cream before it hit the stores this year, toured the campus, spoke with the leadership team, received free goodies, and met Ava Duvernay! Without community, Black Girls Film Camp would not be able to create these magnificent opportunities for Black adolescent girls from across the country to embark on their dream of becoming future filmmakers. Thank you to the Create Action Team at SONY for investing in our work and to Jake Viramontez for documenting our journey.

Thank you to Tracy "Twinkie" Byrd for being a mentor to Sierra and I for the last two years. Twinkie's industry insight and commitment towards seeing Black Girls Film Camp grow as an organization is immeasurable and her influence has been tremendous with enhancing the program. Special thank you to Carlos Scott for being an amazing publicist for the organization. Over the last two years, Black Girls Film Camp has been featured on Good Morning America, in Essence Girls United, Ebony magazine, and several other national media outlets. The camp was also spotlighted at the 2023 Essence Film Festival in New Orleans from June 29 - July 2, 2023. The work of Black Girls Film Camp continues to reach a national audience through the efforts of Mr. Scott and his company, NVision Marketing.

As we begin to embark on year four of Black Girls Film Camp, it is my hope that we create more opportunities to reach more aspiring adolescent Black girl filmmakers through curriculum, outreach programs, and community events. Our alumni are thriving with college acceptances in the nation's top film schools such as NYU Tisch and USC School of Cinematic Arts. They are receiving laurels and honorable mentions with their films made in the camp being selected into film festivals across the world. There is one thing that is for sure... the reach and impact of Black Girls Film in the industry is growing.

I can't wait to see what's next for our girls, our organization, and the future of film because of this space!

MESSAGE FROM SIERRA DAVIS, FINANCE/OPERATIONS DIRECTOR



Black Girls Film Camp had a very remarkable year in our third year of programming. Thanks to foundation grants, sponsorships, fundraising efforts, and donors, we were able to obtain \$342.9k in income and \$71.5k from in-kind donations for Fiscal Year 2023. Most of our funding can be attributed to awards received from our amazing grantors, accounting for 83% of our income. Fundraising initiatives and sponsorships contributed 10% and 7% to our income, respectively. The majority of our fundraising income was obtained through corporate and individual donations (\$15k), and our annual Giving Tuesday campaign, screening sponsors, and social media fundraisers (\$13k). We also attained funding from our BGFC store, member dues, and event ticket sales. Moneys raised from fundraising initiatives have been used to support programs and services offered by the camp.

The contributions of generous donors and internal funding allowed us to continue to provide a free camp and an amazing programming experience to 10 Black girls from across the nation. We provided each teen girl with all the necessary camp supplies, and their own contracted production team consisting of a creative coach and an editor. This year, we were also able to increase stipends for creative coaches and editors and supply each girl with a camera, boom mic, and a small film production budget.

Again, we provided in-person opportunities for our camp participants this year, the all-expense paid weekend production retreat at USC in Los Angeles, CA and an in-person screening and awards showcase in Charlotte, NC. We were extra fortunate to be able to extend the length of this year's LA production retreat by one day for our teen girls. These events created a space for our teen directors to meet and connect with their cohort, production teams, and BGFC alumni. These experiences would not have been possible without the kindness and generosity of our supporters.

Black Girls Film Camp continues to grow from an operational standpoint as well. This year's BGFC planning team consisted of 30 Black women volunteers who served on planning committees. For a second year, we maintained efficiency by having select Black women to manage each planning committee as coordinators. This was beneficial and contributed to the operational success of the organization. We contracted 20 Black women creative coaches and editors for our teen directors, along with Black women advisors for writing, pre-production, production, and post-production to help each teen director navigate the filmmaking process. These women's involvement in the creative process and development of the teen directors' films was essential to their achievement.

As we look ahead, we seek continued advancement of our organization. We would love to increase the stipends for our creative coaches and create new positions. Having the coordinator roles in the past two years has been advantageous, and we feel maintaining and creating new positions will continue to benefit the planning process. We also hope to secure funding and sponsorship to increase each teen director's production budget to help support filmmaking needs such as props, costumes, and cinematography. We want to do all we can to help each girl achieve the vision for their film. Lastly, we're striving to build out an Outreach and Alumni Program to support film screenings, scholarships, and film festival submissions for our teen director alumni. We look forward to another prosperous year, and your continued support is the key to our success!

ABOUT BLACK GIRLS FILM CAMP

Black Girls Film Camp (USA) is a 501c3 nonprofit organization that provides a FREE, national (USA), and hybrid 16-week experience (held once a year) where high school Black girls across the country pitch a story idea, and a final ten are selected to have their short film project produced by the program. Over 200 Black girls across the country applied for the 2023 camp and 10 finalists were selected to direct and develop their own short films. The camp is an incubator for the 10 girls and each of their films.

Participants receive free technology (SONY Cameras, lighting kits, boom mics, tripods, etc.) free software (final draft and adobe premiere), a personal production team of exemplary Black women creatives (editor and creative coach) contracted out by the camp, an all-expense paid weekend retreat in LA, and free workshops from Black women that are award-winning filmmakers and Ph.D. scholars. Films created by the teen girls and their production teams are showcased live during a virtual event over the summer and at film festivals (i.e. 2021 Mill Valley Film Festival,Essence Film Festival, Bentonville Film Festival) and college events (i.e. Emory University, USC, UC Davis, GA Tech, UNCC, etc.) in the US throughout the year.



Following the 16-week camp, alumni participate in international outreach events throughout the year to share their stories with the world and support other aspiring young Black girl filmmakers. Some of the partners for this year's 2023 camp included the USC Annenberg Critical Media Project, Beats By Dre, SHAUN Foundation For Girls, Final Draft, Array, Walt Disney Studios, and SONY.



MISSION

To create safe spaces for Black girls to build critical media literacy skills, construct their own narratives centering on Black girlhood, and share their stories through film with the world.

AUDIENCE

Participants -- High school Black girls (13 -18) *10 selected each cohort

Creative Coaches -- Creative adult Black women (18+) *10 selected each cohort

Editors -- Adult Black women filmmakers (18+) *10 selected each cohort

WHY A SPACE FOR BLACK GIRLS?

Although Black girls make up eight percent of K-12 students nationally, they are more likely as a group to be criminalized from disciplinary practices in school. Black girls also endure higher levels of sexual violence inside and outside of schools than their other female peer groups. When assessing the many disparities and critical issues that impact the lives of Black girls, BGFC is a response to the untapped solutions for creating a liberatory space for them to reach their full potential. BGFC empowers Black girls with tools to support Black girl identity, advocacy, leadership, storytelling through film, and for some may lead to media careers that can begin to change the industry from the inside.

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

In Fiscal Year 2023, BGFC received \$342.9k in funding through foundation grants, fundraising, and sponsorships, exceeding our goal of \$300k. This is a \$150.3k increase from the funding received in 2022. Additionally, BGFC received in-kind donations in the amount of \$71.5k. Our 2023 camp year was largely funded by foundation grants, led by the awards from SONY (\$50k), the Black Girl Dream Fund (\$37.5k), and the MacArthur Foundation (\$30k). Contributions received provided 10 Black teen girls with cameras, lighting kits, boom mics, tripods, free software (final draft), 20 contractors that served on each teen girl's production team (Creative Coach and Editor), and an all-expense paid weekend retreat at USC in Los Angeles, CA (hotel, flight, and meals). Additionally, funding received supported our annual premiere weekend and awards showcase, marketing of the new 2023 films, advisor and coordinator salaries, and administrative expenses. Thanks to the generosity of our donors, 2023 was an exceptionally impactful year.

One of our financial goals for the 2023 year was to gain more balance across the sources of funding we receive. While there's an increase in our fundraising and earned income compared to 2022, foundation grants remain to be our largest source of funding in 2023 (83%). So, our continued goal will be to spread our sources of funding more evenly across grants, corporate sponsorships, and fundraising next year and moving forward. We would also love to obtain multi-year grants to build a sustainable funding stream. It is with your generosity that we can provide such a dynamic programming experience for our participants. We hope to continue this significant work with the support of all our donors to advance the mission of BGFC.

BGFC films were showcased in a total of 26 screenings across the US from July 2022 to June 2023 allowing for the participants' stories to reach an audience of over 50,000 people nationally.
